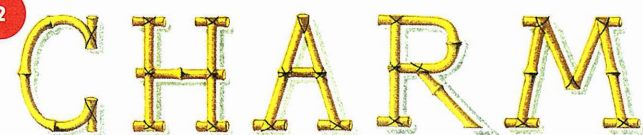

The simple red and black space with sleek black leather booths invokes both grungy pubs and glitzy casinos, making us think that pool might just take over ping-pong as the new hip thing. BRILLIANT CUT.

Luxury jewellery brand Bulgari recently created a jewel-like installation to celebrate their 125th anniversary at the Grand Palais des Champs-Élysées in Paris. Conceived by French designer

Fabien Iliou, a series of 15 8.5-metre-high pyramid shapes were constructed to replicate complex diamond cuts. The mirror finish panels were positioned below the Grand Palais glass roof to create special light effects on the diamond-like structures. Here, antipodean ingenuity steps up as the ingenious panel mounting system that made this installation possible was developed by New Zealand company Fastmount. fastmount.com
